# Derrel Thomas Gibbins (Gibby) 1927 - 2017


Derrel Thomas Gibbins (Gibby), 90, of Fremont California passed away on October 16<sup>th</sup> surrounded by family. Gibby was born September 5<sup>th</sup>, 1927 in Kansas City, MO to Thomas Henry Gibbins and Harriet Mae (Thomas) Gibbins. Gibby enlisted in the Navy on his 17<sup>th</sup> birthday, serving on the USS S.D. Sturgis, and personally witnessing the surrender of Japan aboard USS Missouri ending World War II.

After the war, Gibby, who had a lifelong love of flying, started his career as a flight mechanic. After "taking a walk" with Jimmy Hoffa, he went on to become a pilot for Transocean Air Lines from 1947 to 1955 and a Captain for Flying Tigers from 1955-1986.

Gibby had an amazing career transporting everything from thoroughbred Arabian racehorses, to monkeys from Asia in order to help develop the Salk polio vaccine. Among his proudest accomplishments is logging 10,000 hours transporting troops and supplies to Vietnam.

Gibby was absolutely fearless when it came to flying and it was his greatest joy. He was also an avid fisherman, hunter, volunteer at the Museum of Local History in Fremont, and an Oakland A's fan.

He will live on through his endless stories and unforgettable sense of humor. Gibby is survived by his wife, Ingeborg (Inky); son, Mike; three daughters, Deborah, Chari, and Tracy (Darren); granddaughter, Shannon (Eric); great grandson, Jameson; and his beloved cat, Gizmo. 
Hello. Recently my sister and I have been going through the effects of our Great Aunt Peggy (Peggy K. Harvey, born 10 Nov, 1915 in London, England; died 18 June, 1985 in London, England). She served in the WAAF during WW2, mainly stationed at Bomber Command in High Wickham, England. On 3 Oct, 1947 she emigrated to Canada ( see attached Province of Ontario "Ticket of Contract" and photo of baggage tags).

My sister and I had always assumed that she emigrated by boat, as I did as a baby with my parents in 1954. We are very excited to discover, while researching "TALOA" as per the baggage tags, that she had made the



epic journey by plane. What TALOA accomplished for those 7,000 emigrants, including our beloved great aunt, is truly a remarkable piece of history. We enjoyed reading the personal account of the journey at:

I'm Michael Taylor, a writer in California, (email miketttt@att.net), and am seeking information that can corroborate what William P. Willoughby said in a letter than ran in the Wall Street Journal on Nov. 19, 2009.

Captain Willoughby, who was a pilot for Slick Airways, an airline created by Earl Slick shortly after the end of World War II, says Transocean shipped seven tons of Chiang Kai-shek's gold to the United States in 1949 and that he, Willoughby, flew the gold from Oakland, California, to Denver on a Slick Airways C-46. I talked to Willoughby a few days after that letter was published. At the time he was living in Palo Alto, California. He said he flew the gold shipment to Denver and from there it was flown by another pilot to Chicago and then New York. That's about all the details he had.

Willoughby died in 2010. I realize Willoughby worked for Slick Airways, not Transocean, but am hoping someone out there who is familiar with the activities of Transocean and similar airlines operating in the 1940s might have heard of this.

## Wall Street Journal letter (Nov. 19, 2009):

"Regarding Melanie Kirkpatrick's review of "The Last Empress" by Hannah Pakula ("China's Mystery Lady," Bookshelf, Nov. 4): When Chiang Kai-shek decamped to Taiwan in 1949, he took the gold with him. Trans Ocean Airlines picked up the gold in Taiwan and transported it to Oakland Airport, home base, where it was transloaded to a Slick Airways C-46 to be delivered to Chase National Bank in New York. The plane was grossed out with a payload of seven tons of gold.

I was the pilot of this flight and have often wondered who ended up with the gold.



After a successful 34 year career in banking, he retired from Crocker Bank in 1985 as the Senior VP & District Manager in San Francisco.
