Hello Jeane - I am half way through the airline film history book and now have started my actual writing about *The High and The Mighty*. There are a few items I uncovered as I went along on my research.

One is that Bill Keating's co-pilot on the film was TALOA pilot William Benge. He also acted as the tech advisor on the film and supervised the assembly of the DC-4 fuselage mock-up at the studio. I wondered if this fuselage might have come from TALOA. It was a real fuselage and cockpit that was cut apart for filming. I wondered if any of the TALOA members have a contact for the families of Bill Keating or William Benge that I might contact for information and or photos?

Also (I think) there was a third C-54 used in the film for the final scenes in the picture when they are looking at the burnt engine hanging off its mount. I


noticed your article had the guys looking at it and I wondered if any one might confirm this was a third aircraft or one of the two that appeared in the film?

By the way your lead about the Mansdorf Company was interesting. Two brothers ran the business. They bought and sold many surplus airplanes after the war. First they were based in Sun Valley and then moved to larger quarters in Burbank. They had purchased a number of surplus Boeing 377's in late 1950's and 60's and got involved in the modifications of these to Pregnant Guppys for carrying missiles for NASA and the military. Not sure but the Boeing 377's might have come from TALOA.



## Carolyn Frisbee Boyat has passed...

Carolyn was the daughter of Mona & Karl Frisbie (a respected Naval Intelligence officer) who in her 20's became Chief Stewardess of Transocean Air Lines. Carolyn Frisbee secretly worked for the CIA and lived in



Tokyo hiring women to spy for America. Later she married Larry Bovat a World Airways pilot. After having two children she continued her service to America by (covertly) assisting CIA leaders in the creation of Democracies all over the globe. In her 40's she became Clayton California's first woman mayor and took on developers insisting they construct an environmentally friendly community. In 1979 Carolyn Bovat was part of the first all women official delegation traveling to China to promote women's rights. In her 50's she successfully battled the tobacco lobby and was responsible for mandating restaurants have "no-smoking" sections. She was instrumental in the creation of the Bay Area's planet friendly state of the art public transit system.

No, Tom...haven't seen this before. Very interesting! Is there any public access on the Internet of the control tower log books?


No, sorry, the logbooks are kept in a local history library. No digital copies.
